Dear Members,

Over the past year and a half, we have all experienced massive changes in the way we live, work, and interact socially. The unprecedented health crisis provided us with an opportunity to rethink education. Would the UN Decade of Action and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) still be considered part of the new normal? Would SDG #4, "Quality Education for All," be perceived as a myth or seen as a reality that would be achieved by 2035?

Through our resilience in rapidly adapting our operations in a contingency plan, we have changed the nature of our Association, and continue to provide value to our members. Learning from our perseverance and the richness of our emerging ideas, we increasingly act as the place "where education comes together".

In addition to our annual **General Assembly**, we've continued to diversify our activities throughout the year in our bi-weekly **Leadership Meetings**.

Our quarterly **Council meetings** were a milestone for our governance model, filling the gap between education supply and demand around the world.

Our **Platinum Member Roundtable** was an additional forum for those of our members who wanted more interaction with and through the association, using Worlddidac as a vehicle to reach more education stakeholders than they could on their own.

Our **Secretariat** in Switzerland and Malaysia provides the necessary support and visibility we seek in the global education arena, where partnership could be essential to create benefits for our companies and affiliate members

To better align our activities with regional education demand in different markets, we have worked with newly appointed **Worlddidac Ambassadors in Africa and Latin America**. In both cases, we have already achieved tangible results in terms of partnership, affiliation, marketing, and market prospecting. We will continue to offer closer collaboration between our ambassadors and our members to achieve greater reach to marketplaces at a time when travel is becoming a real challenge and physical meetings with customers an effort.



In a year of social distancing, we all felt the **need to interact more** with each other. Together with the association leadership, we've managed to have excellent panel discussions during the annual ADB Skills Forum, where we've contributed ideas and opinions on how best to practice digital vocational education.

Collaborations with the *Code Organization (code.org)* in USA, *Edtech (edtechfrance.fr)* in France, and *Google Europe (@googleeurope)* provided us with a virtual panel to discuss the demands of coding in education as the new computational skill of our century and the jobs that are emerging.

Our focus on Africa helped us define our membership with the Association for Development of Education in Africa (ADEA), which we hope will uncover the unmet education needs of the youngest continent of our century.

Recognizing the **need for solidarity**, we have joined UNESCO's Global Education Coalition (GEC) initiative, where we have pooled a generous offering from our members for greater interaction. Joining the GEC gives us more visibility in gaining future partnerships with this prestigious UN organization and hundreds of companies, governmental and non-governmental organizations around the world that have already decided to support this educational van of solidarity and commit to schooling without walls.

While we all wait for a time when more face-to-face meetings with partners and customers are possible, we have used the virtual **trade delegation as a new way to meet** with educators and education partners. With a planned virtual trade delegation to Ecuador and a dual virtual and physical trade delegation to Washington DC, USA, we have already set the stage for further interactions with education stakeholders and policy makers, national and international organizations, and bilateral and multilateral development agencies. Further virtual and physical trade delegations are already being planned to meet with many future partners in key regions and countries around the world, as this offers the best value for money to learn about education markets and how they are developing.

By counting on the ingenuity of our members, we have elaborated EduSpace[©] as a **digital portal** where knowledge and skills are symbiotically bundled to support career-related education pathways. Our discussions with Worlddidac members and non-members will provide us with the basis for ensuring that the programs offered by EduSpace[©] target occupations that are needed in many countries around the world. This prestigious project will occupy a large part of our focus, as we think a new kind of education is possible, where competency-based education is certified by employers for the employability of learners and the productivity of labor markets.

On behalf of the Worlddidac Association, I would like to thank our **Director General and Secretariat** for the great work they do to provide a high quality and quantity of supporting



services to our companies and affiliated members, and extend my gratitude to the leadership team, i.e. the **Vice President**, the **Treasurer** and of course the **President Emeritus**, without whose experience and co-responsibility we would not have managed the socioeconomic turbulence through which our association has navigated.

As a constant impetus, education drives peace and the prosperity of citizens within, and among nations. Minutes of the Worlddidac General Assembly 2020

Date: December 16th, 2020

Location: Bern, Switzerland

The General Assembly 2020 was held online. The ballot papers for the online voting were sent to all eligible members (the Statues of Worlddidac, Art 5.1) the Association on November 23rd, 2021 with a deadline to fill the voting forms by December 8th, 2021 and in compliance with the procedure according to Article 14 Section 4 Statutes. The online voting forms returned, had been recorded in compliance with Art. 13 section 2 Status.

The counting of the ballot paper took place on Thursday, December 10, 2020, 10:00 am in the Worlddidac Office, Bollwerk 21, 3011 Bern. The counting of the ballot papers was carried out by Director General in presence of the lawyer, Mr. Daniel Schutz.

The voting results showed that all the resolutions suggested by the Association in the ballot paper have been accepted by the majority of the members. While counting of votes for the new board members, it also turned out that in 7 cases 11, instead of only 10 candidates were selected. This although it was explicitly stated in the election documents that only 10 candidates may be selected per ballot paper. Unfortunately, the affected members hadn't been made aware of this error immediately after the vote. Therefore, the board of directors has taken the decision that the persons concerned would subsequently receive the opportunity to vote again. Although this decision contradicted the procedure stipulated in the statutes for the General Assembly held by written procedure (Art. 13 Statutes of the Worlddidac Association), it was considered appropriate due to the circumstances by the Executive Board.

With an e-mail from 14. Dec., the concerned members were therefore given a deadline of December 15, 2020, at the instruction of the board, to cast their vote again. The additional count of the returned ballots on December 16th, via Zoom meeting led to the parity of votes for two candidates.

Due to the fact both candidates represented the UK, the final decision which of the two were to become a council member for the term 2020-2022 was made by lot of the President Dr Steven McKee, witnessed by Daniel Schütz and Danny Gauch in a zoom meeting at 14:00h (CET) on December 16th, 2020

Almost a year later than previously planned, and unfortunately still under the difficult Covid conditions the Worlddidac Kazakhstan took place as an online event. The largest space in virtual exhibition was taken by secondary and vocational education, followed by pre-school and higher education. The greatest interest was generated by the demonstrations and presentations of interactive technologies as well as digital solutions.

In 43 business sessions, the 31 exhibitors from Russia, Kazakhstan, UK, Spain, Germany, Indonesia, USA, Portugal gave an insight into their educational solutions and products. Each session lasted 30 minutes and accommodated between 5 and 75 participants, most of whom were teachers (67%) followed by stakeholders in the administrative area (21%).

He developed and implemented several projects related to development cooperation, private sector engagement, trainee mobilization with specific focus on women mobilization, organization of job fairs and national skills competitions in Kenya.

Peter serves on many international panels including as a commission member of International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) under the Commission on Education and Communication (CEC) -2021-2025, Commission on Ecosystems Management (CEM)-2021-2025 and WorldSkills Kenya-Technical Delegate, Member - Competitions Committee representative and General Assembly representative to WorldSkills International.

Born in Isena, Nairobi, Kenya in 1988, Monari holds a Ph.D. in Computer Science, MSc in Information Technology Management (Computer Science) plus a software engineering degree from the University of Johannesburg, University of Nairobi and KCA University respectively, he has 8 years of relevant professional experience in TVET and employment promotion for young people and women, private sector engagement, trainee mobilization and organisation of job fairs. During his academic career, he was visiting various industries in the Europe to benchmark with the best practices of governance on establishment of dual VET (dTVET) education. Developing a structural policy for reshaping learning, professional (lifelong learning) and skills development for young people on Africa. Specially developing synergies and partnerships in relation to Sustainable Development Goals (SDG 17). To enhance public private partnerships with learning institutions, industries, governments, experts, and international research centers in the education sector entirely. Ensuring skills development for Africa is spurred to achieve the social-economic development for Africa countries. Particularly skills and access quality education for young people and women across Africa.



From Australia to the World



Tony Brandenburg - I may be slightly different from other ambassadors as my field is education consultancy and system and implementation. Although initial planning my appointment as ambassador was some years ago, I think the major focus for me is to continue put the name Worlddidac into conversation and then explain what the organisation does and how it works. Over the years I have spoken about Worlddidac at UNESCO in Paris, with the Mahatma Gandhi Institute of Education for Peace and Sustainable Development in India, a UNESCO organisation, The Arab Bureau for Education in the Gulf States based in Riyadh in Saudi Arabia,

an intergovernmental Gulf based organisation, and many Ministries of Education around the world including Vietnam, Malaysia, Indonesia, South Korea, Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Russia, Kazakhstan, Australia, New Zealand, Mexico and the United Kingdom.

Much of my presentation focuses on the UN Sustainability goals, especially Goal 4, Education. In some respects, I offer a different perspective of Worlddidac that others as I don't compete for the same place. I have noticed on occasion that many similar organisations are hesitant to work together as Worlddidac and other such organisations are seen as threat.

I have also provided my services to Worlddidac as an ambassador who has hosted several Worlddidac events including a number of events in Dubai and Switzerland. And as a conduit for Worlddidac staff in meeting key people from around the world. A number of years ago I did speak about Worlddiac at the World Education Forum in London. I support Worlddidac in the organization and evaluation of products submitted for the Award.
